


# TPPS LEARNER PROFILE

The Learner Profile is used for students, their whānau and Kaiako to track their progress against the Achiever Values.

Achievers will regularly evaluate their progress through the profile progressions and set goals set from these evaluations. Learning Whānau use these the Achiever Values to work on specific needs within their environments and there are school wide foci too.



At Te kura tuatahi o Te Puke we strive to build culturally responsive relationships with our ākonga, whānau and community. This empowers us all to learn and grow with a sense of identity, motivation and confidence.

Our Achievers are at the heart of everything we do. We endeavour to respond to individual needs, strengths and aspirations. Research and evidence enable our team to develop a culture of high performance based on whanaungatanga, collaboration and reflection.

### Information

### **Learning Together - Collaborative Teaching & Learning:**

At TPPS, our tamariki are taught within collaborative learning environments. Our classrooms have multiple teachers which allows for the strengths of different teaching styles and personalities to impact on the learning of the child. Each child is placed in a specific group (hapū) within their learning environment and this so parents can communicate with one kaiako for their child's learning, progress, pastoral care etc.

### The School:

We have 5 Learning spaces onsite catering to educating children. The school is well-resourced and staffed by an outstanding teaching team. The school has attractive grounds, which include playing fields, hard court areas, a swimming pool, and three playgrounds. All classrooms were modernised in 2010, and we are now one-to-one devices for our 330 students and their teachers. Our school composition does change a little year to year but currently sits at 41% European, 29% Māori and 30% other nationalities.

### How to enrol your child:

You can easily book a time for a tour and a discussion with our school Deputy Principal, Krystal Cooper.

Please ring the school office on 07 573 7434.

A birth certificate/passport & visa plus a copy of their immunisation record is required.

We also need evidence of your address. (A tenancy agreement, sales/purchase agreement, rates bill, water bill, or electricity bill - bank statements are not accepted).

### **Cohort Entry:**

Cohort entry refers to new entrant children starting school as a group, at the beginning or mid-point of a term, AFTER THEIR FIFTH BIRTHDAY as opposed to starting school on their fifth birthday. Parents will continue to have the option of not starting their child in school until their 6th birthday, regardless of whether or not TPPS has a cohort entry policy.

- We will now have two intake periods each term at the start of term and at mid term. Please see the dates below.
- All new entrants who turn 5 before the start of the term can start at the beginning of that term, or at a later mid term or start of term date before their 6th birthday.
- If their birthday falls after the start of term but before the mid term date, they can enrol on the mid term date, or at a later start of term or mid term date before their 6th birthday.
- Children must have turned 5 before they can enrol in school.

We will have eight dates during the year where new entrants start in the classroom. **Students won't be starting school on their birthday.**

### Pre school visits:

All new families with new entrants (children starting at 5 years of age) are encouraged to attend at least three of our pre school visits. Each week we run ACHIEVER time for families of 4 year olds.

- Contact the school to arrange a tour and information session a term prior to starting school.
- During the information session, the transition process will be shared children will have a minimum of 3 transition visits before starting school.
- Enrolment packs will also be filled in after the tour and information session.
- If you are out of zone, places available will be advertised in the holidays prior to the term starting.

### Lunch in Schools Programme at Te Puke Primary

The Ka Ora, Ka Ako healthy school lunches programme provides our tamariki here at Te Puke Primary with access to a nutritious lunch in school every day.

Regular, nutritious food is vital for children's physical, mental and educational development. It affects their ability to focus, concentrate and learn.

Dietary requirements are catered for, and information can be collected upon enrolment. You can opt out of this at any time and can find more information about nutrition guidelines on the Ka Ora Ka Ako Nutrition Guidelines Document.

### **Healthy Lunches from home**

If you choose to opt out of the Lunch in Schools Programme please ensure to help your child concentrate throughout the day, to provide them with a nutritious snack for morning tea and healthy lunch and drink (water only). Our staff monitor students during breaks to ensure they are eating their lunch so that their mind and body are fuelled for learning for the duration of the day. Sweets, chocolate, fast food, energy drinks, juice, and fizzy drinks are **not permitted at school.** 

### Stationery

The school has stationery packs all made up, ready to go for new enrolments at any age level. Parents are encouraged to support this, but if you wish to buy any stationery elsewhere, could you please make sure that you buy only the types of items on your child's stationery list.



### Change of address

### Students travelling to school via bus.

Should you wish for your child to travel via bus, ask at the office for information as to systems, routes and timing - we will then contact the bus company for you and let you know what stops and times are available for you. All students travelling on the bus must have their parents complete the bus permission/rule slip.



### Students walking and cycling to school.

Road patrollers are based outside the school on Cameron Rd and down Kowhai Ave. Patrollers and staff are on duty from 8.30 am – 8.55 am and from 3.00 pm – 3.15 pm. Children and adults must follow instructions from the senior students who operate this patrol. We ask that all parents walk with their children to and from school over their first few days until they have developed safe routines. Should your child be cycling, we ask that no child under ten years old ride without an adult. This follows Land and Transport safety



guidelines. All bikes must be in safe working condition, and all students must wear safety-approved helmets. Bicycles can be stored and locked in the school bike racks.

### School newsletters

These are sent home fortnightly. We ask all parents for their email addresses so that we can send 'e newsletters' so we are more environmentally friendly. For those parents that don't have an email address, we also add all newsletters to our Facebook Page - Te Puke Primary and our Hero app. To add your email to our list please get in touch with the office: office@tepukeprimary.school.nz

### Reporting to parents

Learning conferences are held twice a year. At these meetings, parents and teachers collaborate to develop an action plan to ensure individual learning success. Parents are welcome to book an appointment with their child's teacher anytime throughout the year. Written reports are sent home via the HERO app at the end of term 2 and term 4. Teachers will contact parents to discuss any significant developments or issues in their child's work or behaviour if these occur. Parents are encouraged to contact the school to discuss any matters that may arise.

### **Assemblies**

Whole school Celebration assemblies occur every three weeks. The students take responsibility for the planning and running of school assemblies. Assemblies include such things as children's presentations, sharing studies or stories, Principal Awards, sports results, singing, etc. All parents, caregivers, and whānau are welcome to attend. See the calendar on the school website or the first newsletter of each term.

### **Book Club**

The school subscribes to the Scholastic Book Club, which issues regular selections per year. The books feature well-known titles and authors in both the fiction and non-fiction categories, costing less than similar books from other sources. The school is rewarded with points that go towards purchasing books for the school library. Children are given selection sheets to take home. If parents wish to make purchases, the sheet should be filled out and returned to school with the correct money enclosed in a sealed envelope or order via the Scholastic Loop App.

### Internet and computer safety

Computers and ICT are a superb learning tool and are a vital part of any class programme. All children in association with their parents are required to fill in a Digital User Agreement form on enrolment. It is a commitment from your child to use the internet and computers properly for specific learning needs. The school has also invested in anti-virus checkers and a 'block' on undesirable sites, so children/adults are unable to access them. We take Internet Safety very seriously. www.netsafe.org.nz

### Kapa haka

Kapa haka is a core part of our school and community. Our tamariki gather as a school every Tuesday at 10:30 am to learn and perform haka and waiata. We have a school performance group that attends local events throughout the year.

### Whare Competition

Each Friday, the students take part in a whare competition. They are encouraged to wear their whare tees while competing in various activities and sports. Our houses/whare are Pūriri (green), Mātai (red), Kauri (purple) and Tōtara (orange). Children will be placed in a house when they enrol. Whare t-shirts are available from the school office.

### **Board of Trustees**

The Board of Trustees (BOT) is made up of the Principal, a staff representative and parent representatives elected triennially by parents and caregivers of children at the school. It is responsible for school governance while establishing and monitoring the policies that guide the school. The Board is voted in by members of the community. The Board meets monthly. For meetings - check dates in school newsletters. Feel free to attend any Board meetings.

# BOARD OF TRUSTEES



### The Friends of the School

This is an enthusiastic group of parents who play a vital role in the social and fun activities of the school. FOS's role is not one of a traditional group having to raise funds for the school. Instead, the FOS's role is to create fun opportunities for the students, assist and promote the school in the wider community. The FOS meetings are held on the second Wednesday of every month for new and existing parents to come along and meet/chat with other parents. Andrea Dance is always in attendance to answer any queries you may have during this informal time. Friends of the School are welcomed where you can help out on a given day/event.

### Money and Personal/valuable items

Please ensure that all money sent to school is sealed in an envelope or wrapped clearly marked with the child's name and purpose. This should be given to the class teacher. Children are asked not to bring personal items to school. If they do so it must be on the understanding that it will be at their own risk. Teaching staff cannot be responsible for lost or damaged items.

### **Lost Property**

We ask that all clothing, footwear, bags, and goods be clearly named. Keeping track of equipment at school is a big job; therefore, well-labelled clothing and equipment can be quickly returned to their rightful owner. Any property found is sent to the lost property box. This box is kept outside the office, and parents are encouraged to check it regularly. Staff make every endeavour to return items to pupils if it is at all possible to do so. Ultimately, children must take responsibility for their belongings while at school. All unclaimed lost property is disposed of at the end of each term.

### **School Photographs**

Class and individual photographs are taken each school year with photo life. Students receive a form after their photo is taken with a unique code to log in and view the photos and buy direct from photo life.



### Sickness, late arrivals, early departures

Regular attendance of pupils at school is essential to ensure a sound education. If your child is sick or will be absent, please call the school by 9.00 am on Phone: (07) 573 7434, txt 027 374 5858, email office@tepukeprimary.school.nz or submit an absentee on the HERO app or school website.

If we do not get a call and your child is absent, we will text you, as it is our policy to ensure that the student's absence is accounted for and is justifiable. Truancy is not accepted by the school, and parents will quickly be contacted personally by the Principal or Deputy Principal or Community Truancy Team (T.A.G) if regular absenteeism is a cause for concern.

If your child arrives late to school for any reason, please call in to the school office before going to class to sign in. When your child has signed in on the vistab tablet, a ticket will be printed to give to the teacher for clarification of the 'sign in' procedure. If you are taking your child from school early or for an appointment, please call into the school office and sign them out and if they are returning again after leaving early, they must again be signed in. If you have arranged for someone to collect your child and they are not known to the school, please advise us of this fact. This procedure is a safety issue and helps the school know exactly where students are and who has collected them from school.

### **Medication at School**

It is school policy that medication for students will only be stored at and administered from the school office and parents/caregivers will be required to complete and sign a consent form. Even when forms are signed, it is still necessary for parents/caregivers to first discuss their child's medication needs with the class teacher/office staff.

### Accident or Illness at School

In the event of your child being involved in an accident or becoming ill at school you will be notified by telephone. If you are unavailable we will contact the person(s) designated on the child's enrolment form. Designated staff have been trained in first aid, and the school is equipped with first aid materials. Please note, that staff are unable to administer medicines to the children unless authorised to do so. If the school is unable to contact an emergency caregiver, staff will ensure that your child receives the appropriate medical attention.

### **Contagious Illness and Head Lice**

Many children in their primary school years suffer from the common contagious illnesses such as measles, colds and flu, chickenpox, tonsillitis and conjunctivitis. Any child with a contagious illness should be kept home during the infectious period, for their own well being and that of the other children. For head lice, check your child regularly. If eggs or live lice are found, visit your pharmacist for treatment shampoos and inform your child's teacher. (Also to note, we do have some head lice treatments at the office - please just ask).

### **Dental Unit**

The mobile dental unit comes to school once a year. This is a free service to all children. When forms are sent home by the dental team, please fill these in and return as quickly as possible giving the dental team permission to treat your child.

# Policies and Procedures



### School Docs - Policies and Procedures

Our school has been working with SchoolDocs to create a website for our policies and procedures. The site is live and available to our school community.

The school works on a subscription basis with SchoolDocs to maintain, update, and review our policies. SchoolDocs provides us with a comprehensive core set of policies, which have been well-researched and follow the Ministry of Education National Administration Guidelines. The policies and procedures are tailored to our school, and the school supplies specific information such as our charter, and procedures for behaviour management, reporting to parents, etc.

SchoolDocs updates modify or create policies in response to changes in legislation or Ministry guidelines, significant events, reviews/requests from schools, and regular reviewing from the SchoolDocs team. Our board of trustees has the opportunity to view changes/additions and comment on them before they are implemented. We will advise you when policies are up for review and how you can take part in the review.

# Curious Kiwis

### **CURIOUS KIWIS (YRS 0 & 1)**

In Curious Kiwi's, we are focused on building our students' social and oral language skills which includes how they socialise with others, are they able to problem solve, and giving them the tools to explore within the world around them. In our



learning environment children are able to make choices about where and how they learn, in ways that are self directed, complex and fun. The Te Puke Primary School Achiever Values of Kawenga/Responsible, Kia Māia/Confident, Kakama/Active, Auaha/Innovative, are an important part of our learning. They are discussed and referred to daily and are strongly embedded in our learning goals and assessment.

### **Transition to school**

All tamariki will have a minimum of 3 transition visits before starting in Curious Kiwi's. This is called Achiever time. We hold Achiever time for your child every Wednesday morning from 9am - 10am. This gives us a chance to get to build relationships with our tamariki and whānau before starting school. Teachers will also visit each child in their early learning centers and we encourage families to share children's early learning portfolios with us.


















# Middle Syndicate



### CREATIVE CRITTERS (YRS 2 & 3)

Our Creative Critters class is a mixture of Year 2 and Year 3 students. We strongly believe in teaching our children how to be motivated, independent learners and how to manage themselves both inside and outside of the classroom. Through our school wide

Resilience Project we are teaching core values of gratitude, empathy and kindness which align well with our classroom culture. This year we are following an explicit and sequential literacy approach called Little Learners Love Literacy (LLLL). Using this approach children use the sounds of letters to read, write and spell with confidence. For Numeracy we use a structured Maths approach known as Numicon. Children are able to explore and problem solve all strands using fun hands on equipment. In addition to these core subjects, we are integrating all areas of the curriculum including the New Zealand Aotearoa histories, Science, The Arts and specialised Physical Education.

### TALENTED TUIS (YRS 3 & 4)

The Talented Tui's is our year 3 and 4 learning environment. Within our modern learning environment we have 3 kaiako who each lead their own hapu. This is where tamariki do their core curriculum learning, Te Reo Matatini/Literacy and Pangarau/Math. We follow a



school-wide structured literacy approach as well as a structured maths approach through a programme called Numicon. All areas of the New Zealand Curriculum are integrated into our learning programme and are often driven by tauira/student passions and interests. Our school values are weaved throughout everything we do, Kakama/Active, Kia Māia/Confident, Auaha/Innovative, Kawenga/Responsible. Our school values align wonderfully with our school wide Resilience Project. This programme enables students to build gratitude, empathy, mindfulness and emotional literacy.

### Senior Syndicate (YRS 5 & 6)

Our Yrs 5 & 6 Senior Syndicate follows the values of Manaakitanga 4 Life. Our learning in Literacy, Maths, Science, The Arts, Languages, Aotearoa Histories, Digital Technology, and PE



are reflective of students' passions and interests. Learning is also guided by our school values: Kakama - Active, Kia Māia - Confidence, Auaha - Innovative, Kawenga - Responsible. Learners interact within a collaborative learning environment, which is responsive to strengths and next steps in learning. Students are expected to be capable self-directed learners, using skills developed through the Resilience Project and through our Achiever Values.

We have a fantastic and progressive team of kaiako/teachers, who provide a positive, caring and inclusive culture and have a strong focus on building relationships with learners and their whānau. The teachers/kaiako use a range of evidence-based learning approaches to deliver learning and most importantly teaching approaches that meet the needs of the learners.

Our learning focuses on developing skills for life, and preparing children for life beyond TPPS

We also offer many experiences outside of the classroom, including:

- Ngamuwahine camp
- Science and beach trips
- Year 6 transition to Intermediate
- Year 6 Leadership programme
- Whole school Kapa Haka
- Pasifika Cultural Groups
- Specialist programmes









## Ngākau Māhaki

### Ngākau Māhaki (YRS 0-6)

Ngākau Māhaki is a Yr 1-6 reo rua whānau unit.

Our achievers in Ngākau Māhaki as with other syndicates and year levels, are learning in all areas of the New Zealand Curriculum. Ngākau Māhaki is unique in that we are learning utilising a Te Ao Māori lens including Te Reo Māori me tōna tikanga.

Our aim in 2023 is to be delivering 30-50% Te Reo Māori through integration of learning throughout each day. These times are inclusive of whanaungatanga, kapa haka and tohutohu. These learning opportunities are integrated with the New Zealand Curriculum and aspects of Te Matauranga o Aotearoa.

The concept of Ako or reciprocal learning is adopted utilising a tuakana/teina philosophy. Our Ngākau Māhaki whānau have an opportunity to work and learn alongside peers, kaiako me kaiawhina. In a learning environment that values ako, the roles of teina/tuakana can be reversed at any time whereby we are not only learning from our peers but also being the leaders and the teachers.

"Mā te tuakana ka totika te teina, mā te teina ka tōtika te tuakana"

"From the older sibling the younger learns the right way to do things, from the teina the older sibling learns also (tolerance, patience and empathy)"

We welcome tamariki from years 1 - 6 to Ngākau Māhaki where we have two kaiako and three kaiawhina in our space who work collaboratively and collectively while also being dedicated lead kaiako for hapū, based on year levels within our learning environment.

We believe that such an environment fosters a whānau orientated atmosphere whilst providing specific, needs based learning opportunities and successful outcomes for all of our tamariki.
